Frequently Asked Questions

QUESTION		ANSWER
1	Does the limit of one application per organisation apply to each of the two AISRF components (Science and Technology Fund and Biotechnology Fund), or one in total for this round?	An organisation can submit only one application in total in AISRF Round 9. The single application can be under either the Science and Technology Fund <u>or</u> the Biotechnology Fund (not one for each component).
2	Will applications outside the listed priority areas be considered?	No.
3	Is there any further guidance on what research fits under the announced priority areas?	It is up to an applicant organisation to explain how the proposed project would align with the relevant priority area and sub-topics identified.
4	Will there be another round of research grants under the AISRF?	It is expected another round will be held in 2016. Priority areas for that round will be announced closer to the time.
5	Who are eligible Indian partners?	Indian partners should confirm eligibility with the Department of Science and Technology (DST) or Department of Biotechnology (DBT), which administer the two AISRF components in India.
6	Is an industry or other end-user partner a mandatory requirement in order to submit an application?	No, but involvement by industry or other end-user partners is strongly encouraged and funding will be aimed at projects that can demonstrate a clear path to end use.
7	Is there any further guidance on what constitutes an industry or other end-user partner?	It is up to an applicant to demonstrate how its industry or other end-user partner will maximise the application and/or commercialisation of research outcomes, or otherwise contribute to the project.
8	The application form only has space for 10 key personnel (in addition to the Australian Project Manager) – is this the most a project can have?	No, there is no limit on the number of people who are involved in a project, but you are only required to list a maximum of 10. There is also no expectation that a project will have a minimum of 10 key personnel.
9	One or more key personnel will only be recruited if the application is successful – do they have to be listed in the key personnel fields?	No, only include details of known personnel who will work on the project. However, the role of post-doc researchers, PhD students, etc. yet to be employed should be addressed under Assessment Criterion A.

QUESTION		ANSWER
10	What if a full list of Indian partner researchers is not available by the application closing date?	The Indian Project Manager <i>must</i> be included as a minimum under key personnel. Other Indian partner researchers only need to be listed if they will play a significant role and have been identified already.
11	If my organisation has more than one prospective application, which is the best priority area to apply in (e.g. is there a quota for each)?	The decision on which application to submit rests entirely with the applicant organisation. There is no quota or preference between priority areas.
